Good afternoon Council,

This month, I want to highlight the work that's being done through Bless Bryant. As you know, Bless Bryant is a partnership between FamilyLife Ministries, the City of Bryant, and BHS Student Senate. Our goal is to connect residents of Bryant to nonprofits that serve our community. It's the practice of "we over me."

The Student Senate and our executive team are able to identify several volunteer projects for these nonprofits:

- New Beginnings Pregnancy Center
- Civitan Services
- Habitat for Humanity
- Humane Society of Saline County
- Literacy Action of Central Arkansas

There are also partner churches and organizations who are doing their own projects. sense of community. The Block Party, hosted at Ashley Park, is going to be a great time, with lots of fun for families and a great way to get to know people in your neighborhood. The other thing I really need to highlight this month is that we are continuing to look at our water rates. As far as we know, we are still the only city in Arkansas to see a decrease in our minimum bill. We've done our very best to communicate these changes to the community and answer any questions they may have. I appreciate the team and all the hard work they've done to make sure our infrastructure is taken care of without the extra burden on our ratepayers.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT: ANIMAL CONTROL

Kitten Season in the Fall?

Kitten season arrived late this year - with almost no kittens coming into the shelter until

August--four months later than usual. That means we will have fall kittens available for adoption, a

time when most shelters are starting to see the number of kittens that are available decline. So, if you

are in the market for a purring bundle of fluff, come see us!

Speaking of cats, we are doing our very best to reduce the number of kittens born in Bryant

next season. We have performed trap/neuter/return for 14 cats this year, and hope to increase that

number to about 75-100 next year with a goal of having at least six cats TNR'd each month. While

doing TNR does cost us some, the overall cost is actually less than if we kept those cats and tried to

adopt them or humanely euthanized them. Not only that, we know that merely removing free-roaming

cats from the community doesn't actually reduce their numbers, but returning community cats after

spaying or neutering over time, does. This is a win-win for both our community and the cats!

As the holiday season approaches, reminder that we offer a unique opportunity to help shelter

pets by asking residents to open their home to a shelter animal over the holidays, when the shelter is

closed. These are short-term fostering opportunities, and over the years, hundreds of animals have

been given a temporary Home for the Holidays by our community. Many of these pets found their

furever home with their fosterers!

DIRECTOR'S REPORT: COMMUNICATIONS

October through December are typically our busy months for community engagement, and this season looks no different. October has been a month focused on visibility, engagement, and transparency--both in the community and inside City Hall. Our team has worked to meet residents where they are, provide clear information, and create more opportunities for connection.

We began the month with Bryant Fall Fest on October 4th, where our Community

Engagement Committee and Bless Bryant joined forces to share information on upcoming
initiatives and heard feedback directly from families, neighbors, and local leaders. Personalized
engagement continues to be one of our strongest tools in building trust.

In addition to community events, October included multiple key public meetings. We held Budget Workshops on October 7th and 14th to walk through priorities and financial planning for the year ahead. These meetings allowed us to emphasize transparency and proactively address resident questions about how their tax dollars are being used.

As part of our ongoing effort to keep residents informed about state-mandated water and wastewater changes, we also continued communications surrounding the water/sewer rates at the Water/Sewer Town Hall on September 18th, and we are preparing now for another Town Hall on November 6th at the Bishop Center. Messaging has focused on clarity, honesty, and making sure every resident understands both the "why" and the "what" behind these changes.

Looking ahead, our calendar remains full as we continue our fall event presence across the city. In the coming weeks, we will be participating in:

- CASA Chili Cook-Off November 4th
- Heart of Bryant Block Party November 15th
- It's a Wonderful Bryant December 4th

Each event gives us an opportunity to listen, inform, and strengthen the sense of community that makes Bryant special. As we move into the holiday season, our message remains consistent: the City of Bryant is present, engaged, and committed to transparent communication and community connection.

With the workshops now complete, we have moved into the next phase of the budget cycle. Over the coming weeks, the Mayor, Finance Department, and Department Heads will work together to balance the budget—aligning operational needs, staffing requirements, and capital priorities with projected revenues. This phase includes refining departmental requests, evaluating cost-saving opportunities, and ensuring that our final proposal reflects both fiscal responsibility and the strategic goals of the City of Bryant.

Once a balanced draft has been finalized, it will be prepared for formal consideration and adoption at the December 2025 City Council meeting, where the governing body will take action on the 2026 City Budget. This timeline ensures we remain on track for implementation at the start of the new fiscal year.

Our focus remains on developing a budget that uses taxpayer dollars responsibly, prioritizes essential services and public safety, supports long-term infrastructure needs, and strengthens quality of life for Bryant residents I will continue to keep the Council updated throughout the remainder of the process. Thank you again for your partnership as we work toward a balanced and sustainable financial plan for the City of Bryant.

A Message from Chief Futch

The following information is to inform about the Fire Department's activities during the month of September:

- We had 2 of our staff complete Surface Water Classes at the Awareness and Operations level. These classes are now prerequisites for Swift Water Rescue Classes and required for members of the County and State USAR Teams.
- During the month of September, we received word that the delivery date for the new Ladder Truck we ordered last year has been pushed back from November of this year to January of next year. We were disappointed to receive this news but we are hopeful that this will be the only delay.
- The Bryant Fire Department has received notice that we have been awarded a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant in the amount of \$363,636.36. This grant will be used to replace the aging SCBAs (Airpacks) that are currently in service and due to be replaced in early 2028. The Bryant Fire Department would like to thank the City of Bryant Grant Coordinator, Rebecca Kidder. Her hard work was instrumental in our department's success in this process.

• To close out the September Fire Department Director's Report I would like to announce the retirement of Capt. Chris Poston. Capt. Poston has been with the Bryant Fire Department for 20 years. He has been a valuable asset for our department during these years. His dedication, humor, and knowledge will be greatly missed. Capt. Poston, congratulations on your retirement!!

DIRECTOR'S REPORT: PARKS & RECREATION

- The BASS Swim Team has officially kicked off the 2025-2026 season. We currently have 30 swimmers actively participating.
- Youth Volleyball started practicing in September. We have 89 total participants in 3rd-6th grade, up from 72 last year.
- Youth Tennis lessons ran throughout the month of September with 15 kids participating.
- There are 3 separate pickleball leagues that began in September:
 - Tuesday Night Ladder League at Mills Park with an upper and lower division 40 participants total
 - Wednesday Morning Ladder League at Bishop Park with an upper and lower division - 40 participants total
 - Thursday Night King of the Court Roulette League at Mills Park 16 participants
- Bishop Center hosted the Bryant Senior Adult Fair on September 4. 50 vendors were in attendance providing information for seniors in the city and neighboring areas.
- Bishop Park Softball Complex hosted a USA Softball tournament on September 6.
- The Men's Basketball League started on September 7 at the Bishop Park Gymnasium with 18 teams participating.
- Bishop Park Softball Complex hosted a BASE Softball tournament on September 13.
- Parks Director Keith Cox attended the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) Annual Conference, held in Orlando from September 16-18. He was honored to present a session focused on resourceful recreation in a small department, showcasing innovative strategies for maximizing impact with limited resources. The NRPA Annual Conference is the premier gathering for the U.S. parks and recreation community, bringing together over 8,000 professionals, students, advocates, and industry partners. Attendees engage in dynamic educational sessions, build connections through networking events and explore the latest prodcuts and services in an expansive interactive exhibit hall
- Lifeguard in-service training was conducted the week of September 15-20th. Four

- sessions were offered, focusing on two-person adult and pediatric CPR/AED.
- Bishop Center hosted the John Reid technique advanced interview and interrogation training on September 16-19th in partnership with the Bryant Police Department. More than a dozen other police agencies attended, some from out of state.
- Bishop Park Gymnasium hosted the Bryant Athletic Association's Night of Champions on September 19.
- The Saline County Library hosted Movies in the Park on September 20th at Mills Park.
- Bishop Park Baseball Complex hosted a 2D Baseball tournament on September 21.
- Bishop Park Baseball Complex hosted a BASE Softball tournament on September 27.
- Bishop Park Baseball Complex hosted a USSSA Baseball tournament on September 28.
- Bishop Park Center hosted a Life Line Stroke Prevention screening on September 29.
- Electrical outlets were added at Mills Park in preparation for the It's a Wonderful Bryant Christmas lighting festival on December 4.
- Completed surface repairs to Joyce Boswell Courts at Mills Park by patching areas where surfacing had chipped.
- The new Seresco Dehumidification system has been successfully installed and is operational. We are still working through the final punch list before the project is completed.
- The fencing and gate behind The Center and the Aquatics Center at Bishop Park has been installed. We are still waiting for electricity and internet to be connected before the gate can be fully operational.
- The pool cover for Mills Park Pool is scheduled for installation in early October.
- Started preparing Bishop Park for Fall Fest, hosted by the Greater Bryant Chamber of Commerce.
- Youth Basketball registration is now open and will close on November 3.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT: PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

During the month of September, the Planning and Development Department processed a total of 75 permit applications, of which 9 were new residential buildings. The department also issued eleven (11) new business licenses, and conducted 227 inspections.

The department is very excited to begin kick-off meetings with Crafton Tull regarding the City-wide Comprehensive Growth and Land Use Plan this month. Some of the first steps in this process will be to assemble Steering Committees and begin organizing meetings and data collection throughout the City. We are expecting the initial process of accumulating data and survey responses to take around a year to complete. City Staff members are excited to get involved with this outreach to improve the overall understanding of our citizen's expectations. If anyone wishes to get involved in this process, please feel free to reach out to us!

During the month of September, Code Enforcement Officer and Building Inspector Joe Thomas attended the Code Officials of Arkansas (COAR) conference where he learned about new updates to the International Building Codes. Also during the month of September, Interim Planning Director, Colton Leonard attended the Missouri-Arkansas Bi-State American Planning Association (APA) Conference and learned about ways other cities in Arkansas and Missouri are accomplishing goals and meeting needs within their communities. The City of Bryant encourages our staff to always look for ways to improve upon their skills and knowledge in order to better serve our community.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT: PUBLIC WORKS

The City Council will hold the second reading of the water and sewer rate structure ordinance on October 29th during the regular City Council meeting. Before this reading, a public hearing will be held to give residents an opportunity to share their feedback and ask questions.

Our goal is to have the new rate structure approved in November, allowing residents time to prepare for any potential changes effective January 2026. Under the proposed structure, residents with minimum water usage may see a net savings of up to \$3.20 per month, thanks to adjustments in the minimum bill and rate structure.

Public Works remains committed to maintaining a sustainable, fair, and transparent system that balances infrastructure needs with the community's interests. We encourage residents to attend the public hearing and share their thoughts.

2. Bryant Senior Adult Center Annual Report

Rhonda Sanders, Chair of the Senior Adult Center Council, opened by introducing the Council Board and Carelink staff. She highlighted the Center's role in providing meals and social engagement for seniors who might otherwise go without. Sanders outlined the collaborative partnership between the Council, Carelink, and the City of Bryant: the Council serves as an advisory group and raises funds for facility needs; Carelink manages daily operations and federal and state funding for meals and activities; and the City of Bryant supports operations through an annual contract, with the Parks Department providing the facility, maintenance, and utilities.

Senior Council treasurer Butch Higginbotham then gives an update on the state of the Council's funds; where those funds have come from and what they have used them for over the years. Center Coordinator Deborah Wray then gives a report of the services provided by Carelink at the Bryant Senior Adult Center and throughout the region, including the number of seniors impacted and meals served.

D. Martin and Moore followed up with questions regarding the number of regular participants and if the grant funding would increase if more individuals were regularly attending. Carelink

Program Administrator Lori Greene answers saying that there are approximately 500 active registered participants but that the grant money is a flat rate regardless of how many people are participating. Farmer asks how the seniors have been impacted by parking limitations behind the Center due to construction and the gates being added. Higginbotham and Sanders said that although it is a challenge they understand the reasons and offered suggestions that could help from their board.

Director's Report

3. Parks Department Monthly Summary

Cox provides the monthly summary of activities and highlights that the Seresco dehumidification system has been delivered and is currently being installed. He said that it should be up and running in the next couple of weeks and the fencing and gates will be installed behind the Center once that construction is complete. He then shared some things the Department is doing to try and alleviate the parking challenges for the seniors and says that handicapped members will still have access to the back parking.

Cox also highlighted Woofstock, staff training and current programming. He then gave an update on the Mills to Alcoa Connector Trail and the pool cover at Mills Pool before introducing Cassie Henry-Saorrono to give an update on upcoming community events; Movies in the Park, Fall Fest, Jack-O-Lantern Jamboree and It's a Wonderful Bryant Christmas Lighting.

D. Martin asked if we had an update on the grant applications for Bishop and Alcoa lighting. Cox answered that we are still waiting but did receive notice that due to a large amount of applications that an answer would take longer than anticipated.
